College Counselor

What is the role of parents?

- a) Believe in your child's abilities
- b) Continue to take an interest in your child's academic life
- c) Keep an open dialogue about the college search and be clear about financial expectations – do some research with net price calculators
- d) Stay in touch with your child's counselor – we all want to help our students find good matches!
- e) Address any special needs

What is the role of counselors?

- a) Believe in the student's abilities
- b) Communicate on deadlines/timeline about the admissions process at recommended colleges
- c) Stay in touch about student's progress – for post high school plans, as well as graduation
- d) Monitor application activity – for admissions and financial aid/scholarships
- e) When needed, write the counselor letter

Apply for admission and financial aid in the fall!

- As the student gets ready to become an applicant, the top priority – finding the right fit! NOTE: “You apply for admission to a college because you want to go there!”
- Most MHS students apply between September and December
- Separate deadline for need-based financial aid -- Filing the FAFSA can be done any time after Oct 1.
- The college selection process could last for months, especially when cost of attendance is a significant factor.

Admission application options

Early Decision

Early decision plans are binding – a student who is accepted as an ED applicant must attend the college.

Early Action

Early action plans are non-binding – students receive an **early** response to their application but do not have to commit to the college until the candidate reply date of May 1.

Regular Decision

Regular decision is the process by which students apply by published deadlines, with promise of receiving an admissions outcome no later than April 1.

Rolling Admission

Rolling admission is a policy used by many colleges to admit freshmen to undergraduate programs. Under rolling admission, candidates are invited to submit their applications at any point within a large window of time.

The application process

Anatomy of the application:

- Complete the application
- Send a transcript
- Send test score(s)
- Other items (teacher and/or counselor recommendation), or any supplementary materials

The application process

Applying for Financial Aid

Complete the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)

- Available to complete after October 1
- Uses the “prior-prior year” federal tax information
- FAFSA priority deadlines vary – most at Feb 1 or Mar 1

Naviance

The Common Application

After finishing the education section of your Common Application, you will need to match your Common App account to your Naviance account.

- Complete the FERPA Release Authorization in the Common Application
- In the “Colleges I’m Applying To” tab in Naviance, enter your Common App email address in the “Match” box.
- Note: students use MySSO to access Naviance

Recommendations

Teacher

Recommendations

1. Contact your teacher through Schoology or email to ask if they would be willing to write a recommendation.
2. If they agree, go to the Colleges tab in your Naviance account and select your teacher from the drop-down list.
3. Please allow 3 weeks for your teacher to process your request.

Counselor

Recommendations

1. If a counselor recommendation is required, please go to the “About Me” tab in Naviance to complete the Senior Questionnaire.
2. Your counselor may wish to speak to you for more information (senior meeting).
3. Please allow 3 weeks for your counselor to process your request.

Transcript release form

As soon as you know where you are applying, submit a Transcript Release form to MHS, which includes instructions on “how to apply.”

Test scores

Sent by the student only, not by MHS.

ACT

- You will need to know the username and password you used to create your account.
- Once you have signed in, you will click “send my scores”

Trends in college admissions

- Due to COVID-19 pandemic, a huge increase in the number of colleges that have adopted a test-optional policy in admission. The updated list is here: <http://fairtest.org/>
- These days, the ACT and SAT are interchangeable – no longer is a test “connected” to a certain geographic setting.
- Student do NOT need to take the optional writing section in the ACT or SAT (unless applying to West Point)
- A growing number of colleges have adopted a self-reported academic record in the application (including all three Iowa universities, and the U of M, Twin Cities)
- Also, many more colleges now allow students to self-report test scores on the application.
- Admission outcome could be an offer for January enrollment, rather than for fall.
- Many college campuses remain closed for tours/visits – for now.

Timeline – some upcoming dates

- After Oct 1 FAFSA opens for Class of 2021
- Oct 14-16 No school for seniors (MEA) – perfect time for college stuff!
- Oct 22-23 Parent-Teacher conferences at MHS
- Oct 26 Financial aid program (virtual)
- Nov 1 Deadline for many early action/early decision applications
- Nov 1 Early Action deadline for U of M, Twin Cities and UW-Madison

Timeline (continued)

- Nov 13 No school; opportunity for college stuff
- Nov 15 EA/ED deadline for some colleges
- November Deadline for application to University of California schools
- Jan 1 Regular decision deadline for many colleges and universities
- May 1 National candidate reply date
- June 9 Graduation day for the Class of 2021


Colleges That Change Lives will hold several virtual presentations on September 27-30.
